- the 2005 Lindbergh Symposium at 'Tween Waters Inn on Captiva, a one-day symposium featuring several well-known speakers associated with the Lindberghs.

It continues to sell well today in several formats, including hard-cover, paperback, large-print and audiobook.

A special 50th anniversary edition of "Gift from the Sea" was published earlier this year by Pantheon Books, a subsidiary of Random House Inc. The anniversary edition includes a new introduction by Reeve Lindbergh, award-winning author and daughter of Charles A. and Anne Morrow Lindbergh.
